

# CYCN AUGUST REPORT

### **SUMMARY:**

**CYCN Belize** 

Over the past months, awareness of CYCN work in Belize has increased amongst coastal

communities and environmental organizations. Members of CYCN Belize have been engaged at a

national level with the Ministry of Sustainable Development, Climate Change and Disaster Risk

Management and its Department of Environment. CYCN members have been mobilising their

resources to develop mangrove restoration projects along degraded sites in sensitive habitats such

as lagoons. This allows CYCN to conduct educational outreach to schools along the coast of

Belize. Youth and non-governmental organizations have been collaborating with CYCN Belize on

many community-based projects that have been focused on ways to address the effects of climate

change, securing livelihoods and restoration of critical habitats and species. CYCN continue

  purpose of this presentation is to bring awareness of climate change projects and
  recycling project of plastic bottles in Independence Village.
- Liaise with government officials and regulatory agencies implementing climate change
  projects in Belize following the COP26 plans. The purpose of this activity is to seek
  Government support in involving youths in policy making of climate change-related
  projects and potential to attain funding to attend COP26.
- Development of a sargassum bioliquid workshop for a organic agriculture initiative with youths of Independence Youth Action Movement (I-YAM) in Independence Village.
   Organic practices will be implement using sargassum bioliquid fertilizer and comparing it with chemical fertilizer. Scientific information will be shared with Department of Environment once funding is secure.
- Developing experimental plots of mangrove and Atlantic Goliath Grouper restoration
  initiatives at Bom-bom landing, Independence Village with the support of Building
  Belizean Livelihoods and the Environment (B-BLUE NGO). These two projects along
  with the sargassum bioliquid fertilizer experimental plots have been pitched at the blue
  economy workshop as an advocation strategy to garner international community support.
- Developing a mentoring program for young environmentalist and researchers in climate change related projects. This is a hand-in-hand relationship with members of CYCN
   Belize and associated youth organizations. Common grounds are established to enhance mentorship program such as passion for environmental conservation and restoration.
- Host a live discussion with diverse background of experts considering climate change and environmental restoration of critical habitats such as mangroves.



#### Project Goal:

To encourage youth entrepreneurship in agriculture and innovation in developing a sargassum bioliquid fertilizer product through training of youths residing along the coastal regions of southern Belize. This proposed project will encourage organic backyard gardening as well as diversification of income streams for youths who are displaced from employment due to COVID19 whilst addressing the issue of sargassum blooms on Placencia beach. This project is in partnership with Placencia Village Council to promote organic farming using sargassum bioliquid through the establishment of a community-based disaster risk management program for the collection of sargassum masses settling on Placencia beach.

#### Project Objective:

- 1. Train 10 youths in making bioliquid fertilizer from Sargassum.
- 2. Set up an experimental site with one cover structure and a seedlings nursery
- Set up a processing, marketing and distribution system to sell or process sargassum bioliquid fertilizer

		On behalf of the Maya Forest Corridor Coalition, I just wanted to update you on the late with the Maya Forest Corridor initiative. First of all, the purchase of the 30,000 acre pro in the corridor is almost finalized. Final arrangements for transfer to the Maya Forest Conow underway. Thank you for helping us with your support!
		With respect to the agreement with the Government of Belize, the current administratio that some land taxes will have to be paid on the property but this will be with a discount The Government has however agreed to an exemption on the stamp duties. There are adjustments on the issue of rights to carbon credits. No final agreement has been signed Government but will keep you updated when that is done.
		In the meantime, thank you for your continued support and we hope to next work on the conservation action plan for the Maya Forest Corridor landscape. The COVID situation we seek alternative ways to meet with our community stakeholders especially.
		Finally, most of you will know that I have just transitioned from the University of Belize I position as the Managing Director of the Belize Maya Forest Trust. This Trust is respon management of the 236,000 acres also recently bought for conservation in northwester adjacent and south of the Rio Bravo and a sister landscape to the Maya Forest Corridor capacity, I will continue with my work with the Maya Forest Corridor Coalition of partner reach me at my new address: <a href="mailto:ekay@bmft.org">ekay@bmft.org</a> as my University of Belize address will nafter today.


